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'Robert Frank: Photos' at Art Institute of Chicago

Art Institute of Chicago presents 'Robert Frank: Photos' through August 20, 2017.

This exhibition dedicated to Frank focuses on the museum's latest acquisition of the artist's work, his 2014 book, Partida. The works are surrounded by photographs chosen from the artist's gift to the museum in 2000. Meanwhile, a companion exhibition, The Photographer's Curator, surveys the breadth of Edwards's tenure at the Art Institute. In 1961 with *The Americans*, the Art Institute of Chicago became the first museum to accord Robert Frank (American, born Switzerland 1924) a solo exhibition. The museum's photography curator at the time, Hugh Edwards, purchased 30 photographs from this now-legendary series for the permanent collection and in 2000, the artist generously gifted a further 38 photographs—works that were openly personal and very different from his chronicling of the state of the country in *The Americans*.

Robert Frank is one of the most acclaimed photographers of the 20th century, best known for his seminal book *The Americans*, featuring photographs taken by the artist in the mid-1950s as he travelled across the U.S. on a Guggenheim fellowship.
